Library offers educational diversion during spring break

LITTLE ELM (February 18, 2015) During this year's spring break, when schools close, idle students need not wonder what to do with their time, says Little Elm Public Library Director Spencer Smith.

"No school during spring break doesn't mean there's nothing for the kids to do during the day," he said. "The library has that covered!"

The Little Elm Public Library is located at 100 W. Eldorado Pkwy, on the first floor of the Town Hall Building.

On Monday, March 9, the library will host students and toddlers ages three and above in a drop-in craft program from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. "The staff will be helping students create crafts suitable for the home garden," he said. "It's a drop-in program, meaning that participants can come in at any point after 2 p.m. and before 5 p.m. to work on their craft."

Then, on Tuesday, March 10, the library presents a Family Movie Matinee. At 2 p.m., the Disney movie "Alexander and the Terrible Horrible No Good Very Bad Day" will be shown. The movie follows the exploits of 11-year-old Alexander (Ed Oxenbould) as he experiences the most terrible and horrible day of his young life, a day that begins with gum stuck in his hair, followed by one calamity after another. But when Alexander tells his upbeat family about the misadventures of his disastrous day, he finds little sympathy and begins to wonder if bad things only happen to him.

However, he soon learns that he's not alone when his mom (Jennifer Garner), dad (Steve Carell), brother (Dylan Minnette) and sister (Kerris Dorsey) all find themselves living through their own terrible, horrible, no good, very bad day.

In addition, the library will be offering weeklong age-appropriate programs designed to maintain the attention and interest of students in two age categories.

For students ages five to 12, the library will be presenting the Lego Machines Group from 10:15 a.m. to noon each day Monday through Friday, March 9-13. This program requires registration as spaces are limited. Interested parents and guardians can register their children at www.littleelmlibrary.org.

And, for students ages 13 and above, the library staff will host a pair of Video Game Programming Camps. These popular camps will be offered twice a day during spring break week. The first session, Group 1, will meet from 10:15 a.m. until noon, and the second session, Group 2, will meet from 6:15 p.m. until 8 p.m.

Again, because of the limited spaces in these two camps, registration is required.

"Spring break is a fun time for us," said Smith. "We enjoy hosting the students as they continue their discovery and learning experience inside our walls."

ABOUT LITTLE ELM – Little Elm is one of the state's fastest growing communities. Nestled on the shores of Lake Lewisville, the Town was incorporated in 1966, adopting the Council/Manager form of government.
